



ITH Bengt Jansson lying in the bed next to Henry Harrfeldt at the Royal Infirmary, following his ankle fracture crash at White City the previous night, and with our Norwegian rider, Reidar Eide missing on route from Norway, Monarchs seemed doomed to defeat prior to last Saturday's match against Sheffield.

The Tigers had Scottish Champion Arne Pander in their line-up as a guest and we had to call upon Kevin Torpie to help us make up a team. And what happened? The boys put their heads down and rattled up three successive 5-I victories, something that hasn't happened at Edinburgh in two seasons! The Tigers were 'tanked' from the out-

Credit for this tremendous achievement, and no lesser words will do justice to the result, must go to the team as a man. Dougie Templeton and George Hunter repeated their Glasgow successes of the previous night and it looks very likely that we are about to see a new star emerge shortly, Bert Harkins.

Bertola followed up his eight points at Glasgow with two brilliant wins against Sheffield. He might then have been in the running for a double figure score only his engine dropped a valve and he rode his last two races on the track spare to score two further points.

His partnership with Kevin Torpie produced 14 points and out thanks must go to Kev for a great come-back out of semi-retirement to help us out.

Jimmy Tannock scored six excellent points and with Dougie, he topped the partnership table for the night. Bill Landels had one or two hair raising when well-placed in heat 9, but his score of four had two bonus points.

Dudley McKean, unfortunately, can't get going at all. He tries hard enough, but the points seem to elude him. Another prospect knocking on the team door is young Brian Collins. He still needs more experience, particularly from behind, but he is coming on apace.

Tonight is the World Championship qualifying round sponsored by the Sunday Mirror. Sixteen riders will battle it out for the right to appear at Gothenburg in the 1966 world final.

Five Monarchs take part and let us hope that they meet with better luck than they did last year when we had no semi-final qualifiers at all because of injury.

Each rider has three qualifying rounds and Don Clarke of the Sunday Mirror explains the competition in full on the back page. Enough for me to say that with Norman Hunter, Maury Mattingly, Alf Wells, Johnt Hart, Jack Biggs and the others in full fighting form, Dougie, George and the remaining Monarchs will have no easy task ahead tonight and elsewhere next week.

Bengt Jansson is worried in case his ankle injury will cause him to miss his world championship chance this year. He was to have had an operation this week to pin the fracture and he may be out of action medically for a month or

However, once he is released from hospital, it is Bengt's intention to ride with a special plaster cast if at all possible. We wish him a speedy recovery and hope he is back on the world trail in time to qualify for the final. IAN HOSKINS



THE ROAD TO GOLD AND GLORY

What is it about World Championship racing that brings an extra keen glitter into the eye of every rider, and a sense of excited anticipation into the heart of the most blase speedway supporter?

The answer is quite simple. It is the knowledge that with courage and skill it is within the bounds of any rider to reach the dizzy heights which could result in his stepping on to the winner's dais to be acclaimed WORLD CHAMPION.

Tonight you will see sixteen British riders start their trek towards World Championship

gold and glory.

The reward will be hard earned. Make no mistakes about that.

From the 20 preliminary rounds now being staged on British tracks, only 32 riders from the original one hundred starters, can go forward to the two British semi-finals at Cradley Heath (13th June) and at Halifax (15th June).

Even when over these hurdles there are still two tough finals to be faced—the British Final (at Wimbledon on 27th June), and British-European Final (at Sheffield on 14th July), before the European Final is staged at Wembley Stadium, on Saturday, 3rd September.

And at Wembley the chips will really be down before it is decided which ten riders will go

forward to the World Final, in Gothenburg, on 23rd September.

It is a tough road to ride. Tonight's sixteen competitors know that there can be no quarter given if they hope to walk out to battle as one of the sixteen European Finalists at Wembley.

As well as glory, there are plenty of Sunday Mirror cash incentives to urge riders to greater efforts in these battles.

Winner at each preliminary round will receive a Sunday Mirror cheque for £20, as well as his points money.

In the semi-finals Sunday Mirror prize money of £30 to the winner, £15 to the second and £5 to the third, can be won. Then the stakes get higher.

In both the British Final (at Wimbledon) and British-European Final (at Sheffield) prize money

jumps to £100 to the top scorer, £50 to the second and £30 to the third.

The bonanza comes with the European Final at Wembley. In addition to point and start money, further Sunday Mirror cheques of £250 go to the winner, £125 to the second, £75 to the third, £25 to the fourth, plus £20 to each British rider not placed in the first four, who qualified for the World Final

When this cash has been safely tucked into the bank, successful Finalists then have the Gothenburg World Final cash to look forward to.

Well, that's it! That is the glittering prospect within the reach of every rider tonight.

You may rest assured that not one of them will let this chance of gold and glory slip lightly from his grasp.
