Bryan Seery's Notebook

Mike Broadbanks-12 points.

No-dammit—let's try it in bigger print.

MIKE BROADBANKS-12 POINTS.

This was the scoreline which just had to come. And which everyone—with the possible exception of Mike himself—was absolutely certain would come. And it did. But it was a mighty relieved—and grateful—Robins' captain who sat in the dressing room after last Saturday's meeting.

Relieved because '...I'd spent time on the machinery—I'd spent money on the machinery. I was beginning to think it must be me. And that it had gone for good. I've had the odd duff spell in the past. But never a one like this past month.'

Grateful because "... the crowd at Swindon have been fantastic. In most other sports—and, from what other riders have told me, at a lot of other tracks—there are always plenty of people willing to join the 'He's past it' shout when one of the top blokes slips a bit for a spell. Could hardly blame anybody if it had happened here. But it didn't. Not once. All I've had is encouragement—right along the line. From the rest of the blokes in the team (who've had to try to do my share of the work as well as their own), from the management and from you. It's been great—and really given me the heart to keep trying."

'And while you're on,' said Mike, 'can you pass on a big 'Thank you' from all the boys to everyone who has supported Mr. Kilby's draw for the Riders Benefit Fund. They're doing a great job, and very shortly we should have enough to get a new motor to be kept in readiness for any one of the team who might need it in an emergency. The sort of extra insurance which will come in handy—for we're going to have a real crack at that League Championship this year.'

Perhaps somewhat overshadowed by Mike's return to normal, May 6th marked Swindon's arrival at the top of the British League table for the first time.

Last season only two teams—Coventry and Halifax—occupied the top position during the course of the entire season. Already this year, after little more than a month, four teams have shown up on the top rung of the ladder—Wimbledon, Newport, Newcastle, and now Swindon. We don't expect to stay there perman-

ently—we can easily be passed (temporarily) by any number of tracks who might happen to have a quick rush of matches. But we do expect to be there again when the final reckoning is concluded in October.

And this must now be shaping as a real possibility. Of our regular seven, only Bob, Frank and Pete can currently boast averages higher than their 1966 figures.

Which leaves scope for even better things in the future.

But tonight, team affairs are laid aside—and it's every man for himself in the chase for the game's premier individual honour. Last year Barry was top man in the World—for a record equalling fourth time. The fact that the Wembley prize money has been doubled this year hasn't made him any keener to make it five. It couldn't. Nothing could. It's his desire to win every time which has made him great—and which keeps him great. And while the money is the reward, it isn't the incentive.

Last year Mike finished the World Championship as top Englishman in the competition. Has his spark come back just in time for him to emulate this performance?

In 1965 Martin was a Semi-Final reserve; in 1966 a British Final reserve. Is 1967 the year he makes his breakthrough to Wembley?

Tonight will only start to answer some of these questions. Time will do the rest.

Among tonight's visiting riders is one of speedway's quiet men—a gentleman in the true sense of the word. And yet another of whom it can be said . .

HIS RECORD IS UNIQUE! No. 7 Jack Geran (Exeter)

Quiet man, we said. Might almost be described as retiring. And that—literally—is just about the story of Jack's speedway life. Over the last few years at any rate. Almost retiring.

For he has threatened to retire—and actually retired—as many times as anyone still in the game. But each time he has been persuaded to abandon his ideas. For the simple reason that he is still far too good a team-man to lose. And his points returns are still enough to swing many a match.

While never quite becoming one of the accepted super-stars of the sport Jack has, in the past, been a regular selection for Australian (and Australasian) International teams, and, when Barry won his first World Championship at Wembley in 1957, Jack was the only rider to finish in front of the Champion on the night.

But what gets Jack a mention in this feature?

Well, we've got to go back a bit, but riding for Leicester against Norwich on April 21st, 1961, in a National League match, Jack scored a full twelve-point maximum for the Hunters from the reserve berth.

All right! I know what you're saying. That's pretty good going, but it has been done before and since, and the

operative word for this feature is 'Unique'.

And unique it was.

Because Jack got his maximum—despite the fact that a rider on the opposing side scored a full maximum in the same match!

Yes. While Swedish automaton Ove Fundin was recording his usual 12 point score for Norwich, Jack did exactly the same for Leicester—and the two never met! And the tactic certainly worked. For with Fundin cancelled out by a 'mere reserve' the Leicester boys pulled off a two-point victory.

And ensured a permanent—and well-deserved—place for the name of Jack Geran in the history of the sport.

1967 World Speedway Championship Sponsored by the "Sunday Mirror"

Sixteen riders, from 101 British entrants, go out to race tonight with their eyes firmly fixed on the £1,000 bonanza that awaits the man who wins the World Crown, at Wembley Stadium, on September 16.

Top prize to the World Champion last year was £500. Now the Sunday Mirror double their top award — the highest individual prize in motorcycle sport. Second man will receive £250 and

the third £100.

The Sunday Mirror will also award £200, £100, and £50 to the first three men in the British Final, which will be decided at West Ham, on August 15.

Before a rider can stretch out his hands for these pots of gold, he will have to battle through these preliminary rounds, and qualify as one of the thirtytwo semi-finalists at Wimbledon and Sheffield, on July 13.

From the two semi-finals sixteen top points scorers go forward to the British Final, where the six highest scorers

qualify for Wembley's World Championship Final.

Sounds tough? It is!

Continental rivals also compete for ten places at Wembley.

Their preliminary rounds are now under way. Only sixteen men qualify for the European Final at Wroclaw, Poland, on August 27.

Eight riders for this meeting will come from the Nordic Final (involving riders from Denmark, Finland, Norway and Sweden), scheduled for Esbjerg, Denmark, on June 4.

The other eight competitors will emerge from the Continental Final (involving all other European and Iron Curtain countries) at Kempton, West Germany ,on August 20.
I said it was tough. And keen rivalry

awaits the sixteen riders who battle tonight for World Championship honours.

Rest assured. No quarter will be given. None will be asked for!
