

The forthcoming match against Poland here on 15th July must include Bernie Persson and Reidar Eide in Scottish colours, and any other rider who happens to be on form. England have seventeen teams to call upon for riders and we have been denied the full resources of the two Scottish teams until now. It doesn't

make sense to me!

Quite apart from the failure of our stars, Maury Mattingly, Bill Landels and Willie Templeton hit zero form. George Hunter, riding with a wrist strapped up, rode as well as could be expected and deprived Ray Wilson of his maximum. Dougle Templeton always tried, and with Charlie, was our

only success. Even Bert Harkins was denied a victory by his gremlins.

Just why Bert Harkins can't get his new E.S.O. to last more than two or three laps without seizing up solid is a mystery only he and Barry Briggs can solve. Twice Bert has been in front only to have victory snatched from him. The sooner he can get things sorted out the



Top prize to the World Champion last year was £500. Now the Sunday Mirror double their top award—the highest individual prize in motor-cycle sport. Second man will receive £250 and

the third £100.

The Sunday Mirror will also award £200, £100, and £50 to the first three men in the British Final, which will be decided at West Ham, on 15th August.

Before a rider can stretch out his hands for these pots of gold, he will have to battle through these preliminary rounds, and qualify as one of the thirty-two semi-finalists at Wimbledon and Sheffield, on 13th July.

From the two semi-finals sixteen top points scorers go forward to the British Final, where the six highest scorers qualify for Wembley's World Championship Final.

Sounds tough? It is!

Continental rivals also compete for ten places at Wembley.

Their preliminary rounds are now under way. Only sixteen men qualify for the European Final at Wroclaw, Poland, on 27th August.

Eight riders for this meeting will come from the Nordic Final (involving riders from Denmark, Finland, Norway and Sweden), scheduled for Esbjerg, Denmark, on 4th June.

The other eight competitors will emerge from the Continental Final (involving all other European and Iron Curtain countries) at Kempton, West Germany, on 20th August.

I said it was tough. And keen rivalry awaits the sixteen riders who battle tonight for World Championship honours.

Rest assured. No quarter will be given. None will be asked for!
