



**NIGEL BOOCOCK.** England and Coventry. Number Two to Barry Briggs in British Speedway, Nigel stepped into the breach to lead Great Britain against Sweden and Poland in the absence of B.B. earlier this year. Capped for Great Britain and England in all six matches against Sweden and Poland, Nigel is a regular British and World Finalist.

## PICTURE PARADE

**RICK FRANCE.** England and Coventry. Another having his first British Final, Rick has also won International caps this year against Sweden at Coventry and at Wolverhampton against the Poles. One of England's rising hopes, Rick owes a great deal to regular rides in the former Provincial League.



**MARTIN ASHBY.** England and Swindon. Reserve for last year's British Final Martin is now riding well enough to make his World Final debut in a month's time. Has ridden only for Swindon where his stylish riding and heavy points-scoring is rather overshadowed by Briggs and Broadbanks. Capped for England against Sweden at Exeter earlier this year.

## Tonight's Finalists

**TREVOR HEDGE.** England and Wimbledon. Discovered at Norwich, Trevor first made an impact on speedway at Hackney and the Stars quickly snapped him back. Joined the Dons when the Norfolk track was forced to close down, Trevor has now developed into a solid heat-leader, earlier this year winning International caps against Sweden and Poland.



**REG LUCKHURST.** England and Wimbledon. A discovery from the grass tracks of Kent, it wasn't until joining Wimbledon that Luckhurst really came to the fore, although he was always a man to be reckoned with in his Southampton and West Ham days. Made his only World Final appearance in 1965.



**BARRY BRIGGS.** New Zealand and Swindon. What is there to say about this man that hasn't been said before? World Champion, British Champion, Golden Helmet and Silver Sash Match Race Champion. You name the event—and at some time in his career Barry's won it, but for the European Championship any way! Plagued with injury this year, Barry has still been a match for anyone when he's been in the saddle. Skipper of Great Britain.





## behind the Hammers with **dave lanning**

AND SO TO PERHAPS the greatest, the toughest, the most closely-contested event on the British domestic racing calendar. The British Final of the World Championship. The last hurdle.

Tonight we shall see the 1967 British champion crowned. It's a title surprisingly steeped historically with links with West Ham; the first-ever British Championship was held at Belle Vue Manchester, and won by Eric Chitty, a name synonymous with past glory here at Custom House.

Chitty went on to win it twice more in the next two years. And we wonder the degree of astonishment that would be registered by any of the British Championship competitors of those miraculous, blitz-ridden Belle Vue war-time tournaments, should they see the progress that should be evocative of our parade of many talents tonight.

Yes, we've progressed. Our league system in Britain is now the best-run, slickest-organised in the world. And we are watching the cream of this system racing in possibly the most competitive of all speedway meetings.

**FOR NOT ONLY IS** the British title up for stake. Tonight six, a mere six, places are available to the top scoring riders in the World Championship Final, to be staged at Wembley Stadium on Saturday, September 16th, 1967.

True, the Final itself cannot be bettered for glamour, tension, mounting excitement. It, after all, is the ultimate in speedway. *But tonight is the nearest thing to it.*

At Wembley, every man roars in, dreaming of winning the World title. At Wembley, 25 per cent of the field return after their first outing with their dreams shattered. You can't afford a last place in the Final.

But tonight. There's gold awaiting for not just the first, second and third. There's the end of the rainbow for **SIX MEN**. For there is not one man on parade tonight whose ambition is not to qualify for the World Final.

So no-one will abandon hope. Not until the last race is run, the last chequered flag dropped.

Tonight we will see rivalry, sporting rivalry, at a peak which is rarely equalled in speedway. Tonight six men will emerge triumphant; ten others will creep away, dejected as men can be.

For there is nothing, *nothing* so heart-breaking as being so near.....and yet so far.

**OUR DUTY AS HOSTS** is simple: to provide a stage, a back-cloth fitting to such an event, a meeting which should be tinged in royal purple.

We are tremendously conscious of this honour in staging the event; in being selected for this duty.

But we feel, sincerely, that we are capable of rising to the occasion. Our track here at Custom House is acknowledged as one of the fairest in Britain. Every rider out there has an equal chance. There's no tricks attached; no home track advantage. Any with courage, speed, nerve and skill will find West Ham as simple to ride as any track in the world.

This has always been our boast. The performances of the World Champions, Poland, on their first-ever visit here one month ago, bore this claim out.

**WHAT A TERRIFIC PLEASURE** it is to welcome our glamorous guest, Miss Julie Rogers, one of Britain's most breath-taking pop singers, to her first-ever speedway meeting tonight.

Julie, 24, is a London girl—from up Wembley way, actually—and has rocketed to international star status in the last few years. A globetrotter, a swinging fashion designer, an outstanding vocal talent and a lovely girl—it's gonna be a lucky winner who receives the British Championship Trophy and a kiss from Julie tonight! Her latest record is the old Inkspots hit "Bless You" and we'll be playing it tonight just to say "Thank You" to Julie for coming along.

We welcome the executives of the Sunday Mirror, the national newspaper whose sponsorship of this great speedway event has won them a special place in the heart of every speedway follower.

# SPEEDWAY CHAMPIONSHIP OF THE WORLD ★ 1967

## ★ BRITISH FINAL ★

IT'S SIX OF ONE, AND HALF A DOZEN OF THE OTHER says "Sunday Mirror" Columnist DON CLARKE.

Hit 'em for six! That will be the thought in the minds of sixteen riders who go out tonight to stake a claim in the World Final at Wembley Stadium, on Saturday, September 16.

Two months ago 101 British riders started on the golden road to Wembley, with a gleam in their eyes, and hope in their hearts, that they were all destined for World Final honours.

After nineteen preliminary rounds, and two Semi-Finals, the British qualifiers for Speedway's greatest night has been reduced to sixteen.

And tonight comes the moment of truth. Each of tonight's competitors knows that only six of them can go forward to Wembley.

If these sixteen gladiators think they have had a tough ride reaching tonight's British Final, just wait until they go to the starting tapes.

Despite the odds, you can rest assured that tonight's challengers will be riding hell for leather. They all know that glittering "Sunday Mirror" prize monies of £200,

£100 and £50, for the British Final winners, and £1,000, £250 and £100 at Wembley, are within their grasp.

Raging hot favourite for tonight's top prize must be four-times World Championship winner Barry Briggs, of Swindon.

But reputations count for nothing—particularly in World Championship racing.

European champion Ivan Mauger (Newcastle), Coventry's Nigel Boocock and brother Eric (Halifax); Hackney's Colin Pratt, who rode superbly against Poland here a month ago; Wimbledon fliers Trevor Hedge and Reg Luckhurst, and Swindon's Martin Ashby and Mike Broadbanks, all know their way round this circuit as well as they know the backs of their hands.

All will be out for "Sunday Mirror" prize monies, as well as a place in Wembley's 'Night of Nights'.

The Continentals are also in hot pursuit of World Final gold and honours.

The Scandinavian preliminaries have been settled and Ove Fundin (Sweden and Belle Vue), Sverre Harrfeldt (West Ham), Lief Eneccrona (Sweden), Bernt Persson (Edinburgh), Bengt Jansson (Hackney), Anders Michanek (Long Eaton), Gunnar Malmqvist (Exeter), and Olle Nygren, are through to the European Final, at Wroclaw, Poland, on August 28.

Iron Curtain challengers for the European Final will decide which eight go forward to join the Scandinavian contingent, at Kempton, West Germany, on Sunday, and this is how they will line up:

B. Samoradov, I. Plechanov, G. Kurilenko (Russia); T. Wyglenda, S. Ruarez, J. Trzeskowski, A. Woryna, P. Waloszek, E. Migos, A. Porgorzelski (Poland); J. Dinse, J. Hehler (East Germany); M. Werner, J. Holub, P. Mares, L. Tomicek (Czechoslovakia).

From the sixteen Scandinavian and Iron Curtain challengers at Wroclaw, Poland, ten will come forward to meet the six British finalists at Wembley.

So the World Final picture is gradually falling into shape. Only five weeks to go before the six British and ten Continentals clash at Wembley to decide who will wear the World Championship crown!

TERRY BETTS. England and Kings Lynn. Second Reserve in last year's event, "The Blond Bombshell" has been having a great season with the Stars, having recently taken over the captaincy of the Norfolk side. Started racing at Norwich but had a period with Wolverhampton whilst learning the ropes. Capped this year against Sweden at Newport and Wimbledon and against Poland here and at Wolverhampton.



GEORGE HUNTER. Scotland and Edinburgh. The only Scotsman left in the competition, they reckon the "Meadowbank Express" to be Scotland's best discovery since Ken McKinlay. Rode for Scotland and Poland earlier this year and for Great Britain against Sweden.

CYRIL MAIDMENT. England and Belle Vue. Cyril has twice qualified for the World Final, on the occasions that the event's been held in Sweden. Capped earlier this year for England and Great Britain against Sweden at Exeter and Belle Vue respectively.



## Tonight's Finalists



ROY TRIGG. England and Oxford. Since the unfortunate injury to Arne Pander, Trigg has developed into a regular double-figure man with the Cheetahs. Had his early experience with New Cross, Wimbledon and Poole before joining Hackney, whom he left at the start of the current season. Capped for Scotland against England earlier this year and also for Great Britain at Newport against Sweden and at Wolverhampton against Poland.

COLIN PRATT. England and Hackney. Started racing on the south coast at Poole and Southampton after initial runs at Rye House, Colin started coming to the fore with Stoke, where he stayed until they were forced to close down, moving into nearby Hackney, where he skippers the Hawks. A stylish and high scoring rider, as he showed when topping the Great Britain score chart against Poland here a few weeks back.



IVAN MAUGER. New Zealand and Newcastle. First rode British Speedway with Wimbledon in the late-fifties but made little impression and returned to New Zealand. He later rode with considerable success in Australia and was persuaded to return to line-up for Newcastle where he's been a star man for several years now. Winner of last year's European Final, when he went on to score a creditable 11 points for fourth place in his first World Final.

# One, Two, Three, - and Four?

## Bryan Seery looks at the Records

This will be the fourth time that the British Final has been the last stepping-stone to the World Final itself. In 1961 the British Final was staged to sort out the NINE qualifiers for Malmö. In 1964 it was used to obtain the EIGHT qualifiers for Gothenberg. In 1965 it was the stage which decided the SIX British riders to go through to the Final at Wembley. This year the situation is the same as in 1965—only six of the sixteen will go through to the night of the year.

Last year, true, there was a British Final staged, but it was only a minor link in the World Championship train, leading as it did to a Nordic-British Final, and then a European Final before the big night itself was reached. So we'll ignore last year's for the time being.

But in the other three—at Wembley in 1961 and 1964, and at West Ham in 1965—history has repeated itself in a truly remarkable way.

When something strange happens twice that's coincidence. When it happens a third time, it's miraculous. If it happens again tonight I just won't believe it.

Read on, and you'll see what I mean:

In 1961, the list of qualifiers for the British Final, with their Semi-Final scores, looked like this:

Now, if the 1961 British Final had not been staged at all, the nine riders above the line would have gone on to Malmö. But staged it was, and, as a result, only one name was changed in the party which went to Sweden. Only Peter Moore of the top nine Semi-Finalists failed to qualify, and he was replaced by Ray Cresp.

On now to 1964. This year there were no Semi-Finalists, the sixteen British Finalists

coming straight from the Qualifying Rounds thus:

As before, the riders above the line are the ones who would have gone to Sweden if there had been no British Final. But there was a British Final, and the result was EXACTLY THE SAME AS BEFORE. One of those above the line—Brian Brett—failed to make it, and was replaced by Dick Fisher.

So far, only coincidence.

But then came 1965.

And once again, FOR THE THIRD TIME IN SUCCESSION, the British Final resulted in only one rider, Reg Luckhurst this time, fighting his way through to the Final after qualifying underneath the line.

Three times in a row the same thing has happened. Can it possibly happen a fourth time? This year the line could fall beneath the names of Barry Briggs, Reg Luckhurst, Eric Boocock, Trevor Hedge, Roy Trigg and Terry Betts. Will five of the six lucky lads tonight come from this group? And if so, which one of the other ten will force his way into the favoured group?

Or will this be the year when history DOESN'T repeat itself?

We'll soon know!



ERIC BOOCOCK. England and Halifax. Started his racing as soon as he was old enough to hold a licence, "Our Kid Eric" just failed to reach the European Final at Wembley last year, scoring eight points in the British Final. Topped the Great Britain score chart against Sweden this year with rides at Belle Vue, Glasgow, Newport and Wimbledon, he also scored heavily when capped against Poland.

## PICTURE PARADE

JIM AIREY. Australia and Wolverhampton. Enjoying a great season with the Wolves, this is Jim's first British Final. First came to England to join Sunderland in 1964, he switched to Wolverhampton when the Co. Durham track was forced to close down and but for a year's absence in 1966, has been with the Wolves ever since. Capped for Great Britain.



MIKE BROADBANKS. England and Swindon. "Red Devil" Mike, skipper of the Robins, started-off the season so poorly that at one stage he was almost relegated to reserve berth, but the fighter he is showed out and he soon won back his place as an established star with the Wiltshire side—unfortunately too late to earn any International caps.

## Tonight's Finalists

RAY WILSON. England and Long Eaton. The "Fireball" of British Speedway, Ray is seeking every opportunity he can to gain further experience. Toured Australia last Winter, he's hoping to go back again soon. Has also visited Poland, and in September is very hopeful of visiting Czechoslovakia. Six Great Britain caps have come Wilson's way this year.



CHARLIE MONK. Australia and Glasgow. Sensational winner of the 1965 Internationale, Charlie has never quite recaptured his form of those early months of the British League but is nevertheless still heading the British League averages. International form recently could well mark the return to International Star Status for the "Quiet Man" of Speedway.



GEOFF MUDGE. Australia and Poole. Red-headed Geoff, who skips the Pirates is one of those riders who just never lets anyone down; is always ready to put on a show; but has never really made the Big Time. A solid, rather than spectacular rider, Geoff earned International honours for Great Britain earlier this year against Poland on his own track.
