NEWS AND VIEWS FROM THE DUKES DESK

GOOD EVENING EVERYONE.

Tonight we have the honour of putting on one of the first rounds of the Division One World Championship BERGER Grand Prix, we have also got an excellent line-up for the occasion, we are pleased to welcome Malcolm Simmons, Terry Betts, Reg Wilson, John Titman, Vaclav Verner, Kelly Moran, Craig Pendlebury, John Boulger and the rest of the lads along with our own skipper, lan, Mike and Mick. We wish them all good luck, we know they will give us a great nights racing.

The English lads in tonights line-up are fighting a dual battle, not only are they trying to score points to progress forward in the World Championship Trial, but also to get enough Grand Prix points to get into the Grand Prix Final at Wimbledon in August, they do, of course, have three meetings to help them qualify. Skipper lan's rounds are here tonight, at Hull on Wednesday and Sheffield on Thursday. Mike is here tonight, Birmingham on Monday and Hackney on Friday; Mick also here tonight, Sheffield on Thursday and Wolverhampton on Friday. Tormod Langli our other representative does not have a home meeting as he has had to return to Norway where tomorrow he rides at Sandne's in his World Championship Round. He returns to ride at Hull on Wednesday, Ipswich on Thursday and Wolverhampton on Friday.

Next Saturday we return to GULF LEAGUE ACTION here at the Shay, and what action, we take on GULF LEAGUE CHAMPIONS no less, led by the WORLD CHAMPION, OLE OLSEN. Unfortunately Mike Lohmann has to be away, he has a World Championship Qualifier in DENMARK so we will be using a guest. The "Bees" put one across us last year on the march to the title, this year we are hoping to change that situation. It could be a tremendous battle to do it, but we know that you will be here in strength to back our youngsters all the way.

The Northern Trophy is now almost completed and while we have put up an excellent show we look likely to finish in second place as last year. It looks odds on that Sheffield will win the Trophy this year they have one match to race yet at Belle Vue and only need a reasonable score to make sure. We lost our chance when Sheffield beat us on Easter Saturday but we did complete the double over HULL for the second year running in this competition.

Very soon we take part in the new Four Team Trophy, when our group will include Sheffield, Hull and Newcastle. Besides racing at home we have rounds at the other tracks. Good results in the competition can win us a place in the Semi-Finals and Final which will be run at Sheffield in a full day's racing, something brand new to England.

For many years we have been very proud of the way our supporters conduct themselves both at home and on our travels, unfortunately we have had reports from one or two tracks that a small group of Halifax fans have been using far more foul language than is necessary, we would therefore please ask those people concerned to cool it, there cannot be any call for that kind of behaviour, enjoy your speedway by all means but lets keep the loud mouthed hooliganism of the football kind out of speedway. While the lads in the team appreciate the backing they receive on their travels, they certainly do not condone or encourage the behaviour mentioned above and appeal to those misguided few to belt up and act like normal people.

We have been a bit unlucky with our efforts to fill the number seven slot in the team, first Paul Sheard gets his chance and breaks a collarbone at Belle Vue, then we sign Merv Janke who then has a crash at Glasgow, dislocating his shoulder. We hope that both these lads will soon be fit again, meanwhile we are still on the lookout for more back-up strength to cover for the many problems which can and do sometimes arise.

Our Junior Squad had its first match on Easter Monday and had a creditable draw, whilst the Berwick lads had all ridden as a team last year our team are new to team racing. Their next match is likely to be at Workington on May 11th with a return against the same team here at the Shay on Whit Monday morning.

Its excitement all the way at the Shay and win or lose its the Duke's we choose.

a) World Championship RULES AND REGULATIONS

After all 18 rounds have been staged the top 32 riders eligible for World Championship participation through the UK rounds will progress to the UK Semi-Finals.

If there is a tie on points for the last qualifying place (or places) heat wins, seconds, etc. will determine precedence.

If there is still a tie a run-off will be arranged.

b) Grand Prix

As usual Grand Prix scoring will be based on finishing points — i.e. the winner of each qualifying round receives 10 GP premium points, second place man receives 9 GP premium points . . . tenth place man receives 1 premium point.

If there is a tie on points, finishing positions will be determined by heat wins, seconds, etc.

If there is still a tie the premium points will be divided.

Race times shall not be taken into consideration.

After all 18 rounds have been staged the 16 riders with the highest totals of GP premium points shall contest the Grand Prix Final at Wimbledon on Thursday, August 23rd.

'The Grand Prix lives', And, indeed, Britain's top individual speedway tournament has emerged from a troubled close season stronger and more vibrant than ever.

Its four years now since the Daily Mirror introduced the Grand Prix with a novel method of points scoring that gave an alternative to the straight forward knock-out principle of world championship racing.

Immediately, the tournament caught the imagination of the public and the top riders in the world.

Already Peter Collins, Ole Olsen and Chris Morton have won the Grand Prix title following three dramatic Finals at White City. This season the Final switches to Wimbledon on August 23rd.

But at one stage during the close season the future of the Grand Prix was most uncertain. Our joint sponsors Volkswagen withdrew after two years.

Happily, the situation was saved when the leading paint manufacturers, Berger decided to fill the vacant sponsorship of the Grand Prix.

Already Berger back soccer's Isthmian League. This is their first speedway venture — and we are delighted to welcome them as co-sponsors of the re-named Berger-Daily Mirror Grand Prix.

The name has changed. But the thrills are the same. And the format that gives the Grand Prix a unique flavour is unaltered.

Putting it simply, the Grand Prix system makes every race count — and yet it allows riders to repair the damage of an occasional slip up or temporary loss of form.

Riders from every Gulf British League club will be involved in three qualifying rounds each. First place in each qualifier will score ten points, second will get nine down to one for tenth.

After totting up the qualifying round points the top sixteen will go through to the Grand Prix Final. Their qualifying points will count towards the Final total.

But even the lowest qualifiers can win overall with a brilliant display at Wimbledon — as Belle Vue's Morton proved last season.

Their qualifying scores will be added to the Final premium points of 50 for first, 45 for second down to five for tenth.

It sounds complicated, I know - but it is the fairest possible way of deciding the top overall rider of the season.

I'm looking forward to the action — and I know that our friends from Berger share the sentiment. I hope you all feel the same way.

With Ian heading for his third consecutive win he hit a bad part of the track, lost control and hit the fence, his runaway bike hitting Paul. The result was a broken collarbone for Paul and a wrecked bike for Ian. Halifax were already riding under protest over the state of that particular area of the track which had been damaged by a burst water main two days earlier. At the start of that eventful Heat 9 the Dukes were well in control of the match, they had just won the last five heats by 4 - 2 margins and held a 6pt. lead. But when Ian was unable to take his place in Heat 12 the Aces scored the only 5 - 1 heat win of the match to take the lead and a drawn last race saw Belle

In the Duke's first away league match of the season the Wolves triumphed by 43 - 35 a score-line which tends to flatter Wolverhampton, for Halifax were very good value throughout the match. Wolves found a match-winner in reserve Hasse Danielsson. The young Swedish rider took 5 rides and scored 11 pts. After losing the first two heats the Dukes soon hit back and by Heat 5 they were 2 pts in the lead thanks to maximum heat wins from Tormod and Kenny and Mike and Mick. A fine piece of riding in Heat 6 saw lan go past both Hans Nielsen and Bruce Cribb on the first bend of lap one and Kenny silenced the Wolves fans in the next race when he streaked ahead of Dave Morton and Danielsson to record another win. Heat 8 saw Danielsson's second win of the evening and with Bruce Cribb in second place the Wolves regained the lead which they were to keep to the end. In probably the best race of the night Edgar Strangeland and Jim McMillan scored a 4 - 2 win over lan with only a matter of feet separating all three riders throughout the race. In the next race after a clash with Wolves number one Nielsen on the first bend, Kenny crashed into the fence. Last Saturday saw the completion of the Halifax fixyures in the Northern Trophy. The above table shows the individual scores of each rider along with their home and away averages.

The destination of the Trophy will be decided on May 12th when Sheffield visit Belle Vue in the last match of the competition.

Everyone gets despondent at times; even speedway riders who portray an image of having nerves of steel on the track but off it have feelings like the rest of us. Take as an example two former King's Lynn team-mates who are here tonight in different colours, for midweek tracks enabling them to make more Shay appearances these days.

Both Terry Betts and Malcolm Simmons, who are among a dwindling band of riders to have served throughout the 15 years of the British League, talked of quitting the sport this year. But both are popular personalities with many followers in speedway who will be delighted that they decided to keep on racing and provide the experience from which the up and comers can profit by studying their styles and listening to their advice.

Simmons was ready to announce his retirement as recently as last week after a disastrous run of mechanical problems. He had breakdowns in five meetings on the trot and as any rider knows if engines are not going well confidence starts to slip, and half the battle in speedway is psychological. For if a rider knows his equipment is right and will not let him down, he can relax and concentrate on his racing.

And it should be a determined Simmons too. For he will be out to show the up and coming breed of riders that he still possesses the class and know-how which brings top placings at major events and a slice of the big bookings and prize money at home and abroad. Competition is such these days that no rider can live on past reputation with so much depending on current results.

Simmons, British Champion in 1976 and runner-up in the World Final of the same year in Poland, has helped England to win the World Pairs in the last three seasons. And after crashing out of the 1977 World Championship in the British Final at Coventry, he was back at Wembley in the World Final last year with 10 points from five second places to net sixth place.

Bettsy's case is different for after all his years of loyal service at King's Lynn he found that under the East Anglian club's rebuilding plans he was no longer required to fill his same role. He was offered a position as rider-coach which in effect meant becoming a number eight rider and stepping up in emergency situations. With the big money capture of Dave Jessup from Reading to link up with British Champion for the last two years, Michael Lee, it quickly became clear that an era was ending for Betts.

He considered the situation carefully and understandably was not too happy and with an eye on his future as a businessman, retirement became a possibility as he had become a one-club British League man and was not overjoyed about making a fresh start. Then Reading stepped in with an offer which he found tempting, as riding for a Monday night track would work in well with his other commitments. So the Racers kept in the sport a rider who might otherwise have been lost, and there is a big enough shortage of skilful British men without any more talent disappearing from the scene.

A change can be as good as a rest, of course, and a change of track can often benefit a rider in more ways than one. Perhaps Bettsy will show everyone that his magic is still there with another good run in the World Championship and Grand Prix. Last season, the England selectors showed how highly he is still thought of by recalling him to lead a makeshift England team against Australiasia at Hull when the Test coincided with the rearranged British Final of the World Championship. It was decided to go ahead with the Test, which marked the full international debut of Dukes skipper, Ian Cartwright, because of the amount of sponsorship involved and the difficulty in getting everyone together again.

Northern Riders Champion, Reg Wilson won the Autumn Classic at the Shay last October and led Sheffield to their 12 point victory at the Shay a fortnight ago so he is again going to be in the chase for the top spot and progress on the World Championship trail. Ian Cartwright needs World Championship points tonight, too, as he attempts to make up for last season's disappointment when a siezed engine at Sheffield ended his chance of a first British Final appearance.

Mike Lohmann and Mick McKeon are, of course, concerned with getting Grand Prix premium points along with Czech, Vaclav Verner, Hull's American spectacle merchant Kelly Moran and Craig Pendlebury, who wants points in both competitions. Unfortunately Tormod Langli has to take his three Grand Prix meetings on away tracks because he is in Norway this weekend for his World Championship qualifier.

Langli will want to be free of bike problems next week for he has his meetings on successive nights — at Hull on Wednesday, Ipswich Thursday and Wolverhampton Friday. And for anyone wanting to follow the Dukes in Northern meetings, Cartwright is also at Hull and Sheffield and McKeon is at Sheffield too.
