

This evening, for 8 riders there will be delight, for the other 8 disappointment. The aim of all ambitious riders is to be World Champion and while few riders ever achieve that exalted position, it still remains the goal. The top 8 tonight will stay in the competition and will be hopeful of even further progression and for the rest it will be back to the drawing board and the hope that next year will be the one.

The line up tonight is an interesting one with a fine blend of youth and experience which will provide plenty of fireworks. Current British Champion, Michael Lee and former World Champion, Peter Collins head the list along with the experience of riders such as Gordon Kennett, number 2 in the World last year, Doug Wyer, Jim McMillan and Bobby Beaton. Youth is represented by rising stars, Ian Cartwright, Joe Owen, Steve Bastable etc but I think that everyone's eyes will be centred on Halifax's precocious teenager Kenny Carter. In his first full season of British league racing Kenny is making everyone sit up and take notice with some exciting performances wherever he goes and tonight will be no exception.

Welcome to the Sunday Mirror our sponsors of this evening's meeting and who have been associated with the World Championship as long as I can remember. They have been a good friend to Speedway over the years and stayed with us when things were a bit on the lean side. A must on Sunday morning is Keith Fisher's up to date column which is always interesting and accurate, which is more than can be said of some, these days. I am sure that they will be well entertained tonight with the track action to come.

Next Tuesday we are staging the postponed Speedway Star Knock out Cup fixture against Cradley for the first leg. The second leg which was also postponed will now take place on Saturday June 16th at Cradley, This year the competition will be staged over 18 heats of racing with no tactical substitutes allowed during the match and no Guests or Rider replacement allowed for missing riders. Also teams will consist of 8 riders instead of the usual 7 with clubs being allowed to recall their loanees for these matches if they so wish.

PITSIDE BY MIKE HOLT

Having recently had the opportunity to try out the new Knock Out Cup eighteen heat formula, whilst acting as team manager for the Lions at Cradley in a challenge fixture, I feel that certain

amendments will be necessary if it is to be successful.

At the moment under the new formula rider replacement is banned, as are tactical substitutes and guest riders, teams use eight riders and not seven as for normal Gulf British League action. Whilst I can understand banning Guests and rider replacement, I feel that not allowing the team managers to use tactical substitutes is rather limiting him, particularly in a one sided contest. Surely the fans have a right to see as even a contest as possible and at the moment the only way a manager can make effective changes is if he happens to have one of his reserves in top form.

I would suggest perhaps that the away team should be allowed to use tactical substitutes and that the home side should not, for at least then the fans in most cases would see a far more interesting meeting, certainly the eight man formula seems to benefit the stronger teams

and in my opinion makes the weaker teams look even weaker than they are.

I was pleased to see that early press reports that Hackney's Keith White had broken his thigh at Birmingham recently, were not correct and that Keith had suffered only a broken ankle, bad enough on its own but certainly not anywhere as serious as a broken thigh. I wonder sometimes how the press get some of these stories. It was like the report put out last week by Radio Leicester about our Four Team event, it contained so many inaccuracies that by 7.30 a.m. the station had received well over a hundred calls from irate fans complaining about it and it seems to prove that reporters need to know quite a bit about our sport in order to report accurately upon it.

I was very impressed by Birmingham's Andy Grahame in their round of the Four Team event, he is the younger brother of Cradley's Alan and is currently on loan to National League Milton Keynes. The way he picked up 10 points suggests however that it will not be long

before he becomes a regular at Perry Barr.

Tonight we welcome the 16 British riders who have their sights set on the World Title, with their next goal the British Final at Coventry on June 20. In the line-up we have a man who has already reached the dizzy heights of being World Champion, Peter Collins, and the present British Champion, Michael Lee. But a look at the rest of the field shows just how tough it can be to achieve those titles. All have had to fight their way through tough qualifying stages, and some cases not only against their fellow countrymen, but, due to the Grand Prix/ World Championship combined rounds, have also had to meet the top men from other countries. No easy task. Some have even fought through from the preliminaries and caused some raised eyebrows in the process. It's on the cards that those eyebrows could be raised even higher tonight. We wish the best of luck to all competitors, and may the gremlins stay away.

The gremlins certainly haven't stayed away from the Lions' camp. There's the skipper still trying to sort out his aggravation. He thought he'd succeeded, then stripped teeth from a cog in his engine saw him have to pull out of the meeting at Cradley. Not having the necessary spare, he then had to travel all the way up to Halifax on the Sunday night to get another to enable him to get his engine ready for the trip to Birmingham. All that 'aggro' and still no end result!

John Titman was finding everything going just great here last week in the Four-Team, with three wins under his belt. Then he found traces of metal in the oil, and not wishing to press his luck and "blow" his engine, he switched to his second machine. But his last ride saw him make a diabolical gate and when he came back to the pits his clutch was hot enough to cook anything you care to name in seconds. That meant "Tito" had to burn the midnight oil to get set up for the Midland Riders' Final at Coventry the following night.

Last Tuesday John McNeill still wasn't happy with his engine. "Still no steam there", said John. The previous night at Birmingham he'd been the Lions' top scorer, and I thought he'd cracked his problem. But the secret of his success was that he'd borrowed brother Greg's engine. "But he was up early the next morning to whip it out of my bike and put it back in his ready for the meeting at Milton Keynes", said John. John is now weighing up all sorts of devious plans to get his hands on Greg's engine. "That might end my problems", cracked John. I don't think Greg would support that idea.

Ila's trip to the Continent proved worth-while. He qualified for the World Final of the grass track event. "It took me seven years to reach a speedway World Final . . . but only one to reach this Final", a very pleased Ila told me. But he wasn't so jubilant over his new Jawa that he'd just taken delivery of and tried out after last Tuesday's meeting. "It kept dying on me", he said. Looks like J.B., Tom and Ila will have to have a few words with Ole Olsen. His certainly motors!


Or they could take a tip from young Kenny Carter of Halifax, who is programmed tonight, who had the same sort of problems, hastily switched back to Weslake, and has caused quite a stir in the process including notching those 35 points that got him here tonight.

And lets hope things are well and truly sorted for Saturday's trip to Belle Vue. It's a tough one, but it would do everyone the world of good to see the lads give a good account of themselves. It's time that the potential on paper showed itself in the reality of points scored.

An expensive time for John Titman in the course of his grass tracking exploits. Down in Devon recently he was doing very nicely, having notched 11 points, when his engine "blew" when he was going full bore and coming up to the tight turn. "The rod came straight through the front of the engine", said John. "Never seen one like it." Just how bad it was John discovered when he went to put another engine in. "The rod had not only come through the engine, but had bent the front of the frame more than two inches and in no way could we get the other engine in", added John. It was also a very dicy moment for "Tito", for he had no means of slowing when he went into that turn, for there was only a tiny piece of the rod flopping around on the crank. "There was nothing for it but to bale out", cracked John.

Mike Farrell was gritting his teeth on Tuesday while putting up a determined effort. His injured hand was proving very painful. "It was O.K. for the first couple of laps, but after that I was more than glad to see that chequered flag", he said. It was great credit to Mike that he stuck at it, and he certainly showed, that once that hand is 100 per cent fit he will be back tigering with the best. And that's going to prove useful with the Lions' League campaign getting under way in earnest.

Next week we should at last be entertaining Cradley Heath. At least they are programmed to be here. I say "should be here", because if you make definite statements about a visit from Cradley this year the "weather man" goes out of his way to prove you wrong.
