Tonight is a great night in the history of Christchurch speedway — for New Zealand speedway in fact — this is the first ever Australasian Final to be held in our home town, very proudly referred to, as the 'Home of the Champions'.

For me personally, tonight is even extra special and very nostalgic as it brings to mind many memories of my early days in sport, when I followed my hero, Ronnie Moore, who took me to England and tutored me to follow in his footsteps as World Speedway Champion. In in turn took another Kiwi, Larry Ross, who has made me very proud with his progress, and who I hope is in line for World Championship honours also.

In the meantime of course, another son of Christchurch, Ivan Mauger has kept New Zealand at the top of the speedway tree with an incredible six World Championship wins — bringing New Zealand to an unequalled 12 World Titles — a fantastic achievement, especially as all these were by riders from Christchurch . . . not bad for our little town . . . and now we have a string of young riders, including my own son Tony, who are doing their best to keep this 'The Home of the Champions' and to add some more titles to that World Championship record.

Our hopes this year are with Larry Ross, who made it to last year's World Championship as Reserve and is determined that this will be his big year. Snapping at his heels, we have Auckland's Mitch Shirra, who together with Ivan, Larry and Bruce Cribb of Palmerston, successfully brought the World Team Cup to New Zealand for the first time. A great triumph for our little country and I might add, a great shock to some of the 'big guns' . . . the English and the Danes were favourites but the eventual stars were New Zealand followed by the Americans.





1 JOHN TITMAN (Queensland)

Finished third on equal score of 12 points after a run-off in the recent Aust. Title. 1977 Australian Title-holder and dual World Finalist at Wembley (78) and again last year in Poland, John is 3 times Queensland State Champion and would be one of the most dedicated, best respected Australian representatives ever to captain the Kangaroos on International duty. Appeared at Brisbane Exhibition in 1968 and wasted no time in jetting into England and professionalism in 1972 when he was contracted to First Division Halifax, 1975 transferred to Exeter and in 1978 to Leicester where he finished with a 9 point average. Married, John celebrated his 29th on the night of the Australian Final, January 26th.

2 MITCH SHIRRA (Auckland)

Pint sized flier with years of experience that belie his youth. Caused a sensation when he started racing at the tender age of 14 and when found out was banned until he reached the age of 17. Commenced his English racing in second division during 1975 and then moved up to Coventry. Truly an international born of a Scottish father in New Zealand and raised in Australia has ridden as an Aussie for a number of years but now races as a Kiwi and indeed was a member of New Zealand's successful team in the 1979 World Team Cup competition. An exciting rider to watch.

3 STEVE KOPPE (Queensland)

Fifth on the National rostrum with 10 points, enjoued a taste of early success when he took out the North Queensland Championship at the ripe old age of 16. Made the long haul to England in 1976 when he joined National League Canterbury, on loan to First Div Exeter for two seasons and was promoted to full time Pro League last year with Exeter. Won the National League Riders' Championship at Wimbledon in 1978 in fine form, and subsequently announced his planned rise to Division One. Like Titman, Steve is a mechanic by trade and one of the quiet men of the racing set. 27 next April and married, the name Koppe has made quite an impression on the International racing scene.

10 point Average - 1979 Second Div.

4 PHIL CRUMP (Victoria)

Ex Australian Title-holder and undoubtedly one of the Big Three Down Under, Phil holds the One, Four and Six lap records at his home track Mildura and the Three lap record at Sydney Showgrounds. Runner-up in the recent Australian Title on 12 points, won on a run-off with Titman. Holds the 1975 and 1979 National Title, finished third in the 1976 World Final in Poland and shared in Australia's 1976 World Team Cup victory. At the 1977 Australasian Final in Sydney, Phil drew for first place along with Mauger and Boulger, all on 14 points and forcing a 3 way run-off, finished second to Mauger. Ex cricket pro, Phil commenced riding for Second Division Crewe in 1971 and quickly progressed to Div One King's Lynn the following year, Newport in 1974 and captained Bristol inn 1977, currently signed to Swindon. Twenty seven year old Phil is married with two children.

5 GLENN McDONALD (New South Wales)

Toted 9 points in the Australian Final but lost valuable points when he fell in his opening ride. Relatively new to the solo racing scene, a former Double State Short circuit champion in 1978 who commenced racing at Sydney Showgrounds the same year. Made a successful tour of the North in 1978 and was snatched up for English duties when he was signed by Second Division Nottingham. Made quite an impression at his initial launching but fell victim to injury shortly after, following a bad crash at Newcastle (UK). Glenn is blessed with total dedication to the sport, despite his misfortune in injury and finished third in his NSW qualifying round. He is 23 and married, a draftsman by trade.

6 MIKE FARRELL (Queensland)

Also finishing on 10 points, Mike Farrell hails from Townsville, as does Koppe and has also enjoyed several seasons of pro speedway in the jet set of Australia. Former Moto cross rider who was spotted by British Lions Team Manager, Wally Mawdsley, in 1974 who immediately signed him to race for First Division Exeter the following year, with only two season's riding to his total racing career. Prior to his U.K. move he reigned as Queensland Junior Champion and Barrier Reef Senior Champion, both in 1974 and was runner-up to Titman in the Queensland State title just prior to Xmas. Highly respected for his fiery determination, Mike is a mechanic by trade, 24 and married.

7 TONY BRIGGS (Christchurch)

17 year old boy wonder, son of the legendary Barry Briggs, M.B.E. four times World Champion. Last year he wintered over in U.S.A. where he raced with many successes gaining valuable experience before entering the hurly burly of English league racing. A fine third place in the recent New Zealand Championship only 2 points behind the experienced Larry Ross augers well for his future. Under dad's watchful eye he will be out to impress tonight.

8 MIKE FULLERTON (Auckland)

One of New Zealand's top riders for a number of seasons can always be relied on to give a good account of himself. Has been racing in England for a number of seasons and knows well the importance of tonight's meeting. Mike comes from a family with a very long association in Speedway racing and administration.

9 DAVID BARGH (Wellington)

Another exciting 17 year old who finished on equal points with Larry Ross in the New Zealand Championship only to be beaten in the run off, no disgrace against a rider of Larry's calibre. David has been tutored by the great Ronnie Moore and is obviously a good learner and if he continues with his English league racing the skies the limit.

10 BILLY SANDERS (New South Wales)

New 1980 Australian Solo Champion won on a brilliant maximum performance at Sydney Showgrounds. 1978 Title-holder who recently outrode current World Champion Ivan Mauger at home and has, of late, revelled in the acquisition of numerous open meetings featuring many World class riders on tour. Billy finished fifth in last year's World Final at Katowice, Poland and is 4 times N.S.W. Champion. Vastly experienced World Class International, Sanders commenced riding in 1971 and was signed full time to First Division Ipswitch in England the following season where he spent the next seven seasons racing, switched to Midlands-based Birmingham last. A former amateur boxer, 24 year old Billy is married with a young son. Would have to be Australia's hope for 1980.

10.3 average (78-89)

11 GLYN TAYLOR (Western Australia)

Current Master of Claremont and 2nd in W.A. title. Nine points at the Australian Title, at 26, married with two children and with ten years International globe-trotting on the track, Glyn could almost be classed a Speedway veteran. It's a hard act to follow when you are son of former Australian Champion and World Finalist Chum Taylor but Glyn has followed through admirably. Travelled to England in 1973 and signed for Division Two Crewe, also appeared the same year for Peterborough. Won the W.A. Qualifying round in 1977 and returned to First Division Racing for Reading but was forced to return home several weeks later after a family bereavement. Was runner-up in the 1972 W.A. Championship and finished 4th in the 77-78 Australian Title.

12 WAYNE BROWN (Wellington)

Another of the Kiwi young brigade gradually making his name known on the international scene. The only rider to beat Larry Ross at the New Zealand Championship which was no mean feat. With a Kiwi crowd behind him tonight should really make his presence known.

13 KEITH WRIGHT (Western Australia)

Seven points saw him scrape through as 9th qualifier, despite a tape exclusion and engine failure in his National outing. Surprise inclusion, at the expense of Mike McKeon, Keith finished Third in the W.A. round behind Moores and Taylor. Has yet to taste the sweet smell of success overseas but hailed as one of the most furious, fastest rising stars the West had produced for some time and maybe for some time to come — tonight will tell. . . . Twenty year old Wright would be one of the youngest to line up for the big one.

14 PHIL HERNE (New South Wales)

Notched up 10 points to finish fourth in the Australian Title, drew for equal placing with Koppe and Farrell but won on a countback... Long term buddy to Sanders, Phil also featured in the 1976 World Team Cup victory to Australia along with Crump, Boulger and Sanders. Suffered a major set back in his riding career after a horrific crash at Poole (U.K.) where he sustained

serious back injuries. Former multi National Finalist, Phil has been riding since the age of 17 and experienced his first taste of "The Real Thing" in 1973 when he joined Second Division Birmingham and was subsequently promoted to Newport 1975, Bristol 1977 and back to Birmingham (then Div One) in 1978. Finished fourth in his qualifying round but lined up in Sydney when Guglielmi dropped out with an ankle injury. 24 year old Phil is married and soon a father-to-be.

8.6 Average 1979 Division One.

15 GRAEME STAPLETON (Christchurch)

Long serving New Zealand test rider who really knows his way around Ruapuna. An international Moto cross rider with the Bultaco works team in Europe before turning his hand to Speedway he made the transition in rapid fashion. Almost a fixture at the Wimbledon track in England for many seasons and more recently with Newcastle "Stape" is a never say die rider and an expert at the art of teams racing.

16 LARRY ROSS (Christchurch)

Current New Zealand Champion and in doing so equalled Ronnie Moores record of four Championships (consecutive). Member of the winning World Team Cup foursome last year, Larry must be New Zealand's number one chance tonight. Another in the long line of Christchurch to race for Wimbledon in England, his professional approach and immaculate preparation are a credit to himself and the sport of Speedway. Only just missing a place in last year's World Final there will be many fans at Ruapuna behind him tonight in his attempt to qualify and make the 1980 Final.
