FROM THE MANAGER'S CHAIR

Wimbledon Stadium is steeped in Speedway History, probably more so than any other track, but the staging of the 1980 Commonwealth Final represents yet another first for us.

This will be the most important World Championship Event ever held here; a track that has held many of the sport's most prestigious meetings during its 52 year run in Speedway.

The management of Wimbledon Stadium are both proud and delighted to be presenting this meeting on a track that is a little different than usual this evening to comply with FIM regulations. We like to think that Wimbledon is a fair track — one which allows plenty of passing, inside and out, and does not put too great an emphasis on gating.

The Commonwealth Final was originally scheduled for the London White City, but when that track was ruled out Wimbledon stepped into

the breach.

To those who ask why we are holding this meeting in the evening and not the afternoon, the answer is a simple one: the capacity of the Stadium is something of an unknown quantity. We think it is around 15,000 and we would not like to see more than that number inside. If we had started this afternoon there would have been a real chance of more than 15,000 people arriving, in which case the doors would have been shut with many fans left outside. By staging tonight we probably cut down the potential attendance, but will be able to accommodate everyone in the style that is associated with Wimbledon.

On behalf of the Wimbledon management I would like to welcome our many guests of this evening, including dignitaries from the F.I.M., the A-C.U., the S.C.B. and the B.S.P.A. Mr. Charles Ringblom is the FIM Steward today and it is nice to see him back at Plough Lane.

Good evening also to our friends from the Sunday Mirror, Sponsors of the meeting, and their Speedway writer Keith Fisher. In fact, we have a considerable number of journalists here from National and Provincial Newspapers, Magazines and Broadcasting. It would be impossible to mention everyone, but if I say welcome to SWAPA — The Speedway Writers'

and Photographers' Association — that will embrace them all.

This is the third major individual event to be held at Wimbledon this season. John Davis won the Daily Express Spring Classic in March, while Dave Jessup took the Embassy Internationale in May. Both will be competing this evening, of course, along with the defending Commonwealth Champion Michael Lee.

World Champion Ivan Mauger will be making his first appearance of the year at Wimbledon, but as he began his British career here many moons ago I am sure that won't be a handicap. Good Luck to him and all the competitors, especially Wimbledon's own Larry Ross.

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Rising to the Occasion

The race for the 1980 World Championship intensifies this evening but already a number of notable contenders have fallen by the wayside.

Riders have been bidding for places in Gothenburg on September 5 since as long ago as November 1979. That was when America staged its round of the competition at the magnificent Anaheim Stadium in Southern California.

There was controversy, argument, accusation and counter-accusation about the track but few would dispute that the two qualifiers — Bruce Penhall and Scott Autrey — are the cream of the American speedway talent.

But riders like Dennis Sigalos, Bobby Schwartz and Ronnie Preston went out — 10 months before the final. This is not the platform to campaign for a different routing system, a scheme that enables more of the best riders to reach the final, but the loss of pedigree men so early does nothing to enhance the championship.

After the American rounds came those in Australia and New Zealand. Few surprises there, with current World Champion Ivan Mauger seeded through to this evening's event. Neither country is rich in world class talent at present, though the Kiwis have some fine youngsters coming through and the Australian pipeline appears to be bubbling again.

However, the five qualifiers from the Australasian Final — Billy Sanders, Phil Crump, John Titman, Larry Ross and Mitch Shirra — were predictable enough.

Europe began next, with qualifying rounds being staged in some unlikely places and being contested by riders with barely pronouncable names. The continental route is a meandering one but so far most of the big names have managed to survive.

The Soviet Union also suffers from a paucity of genuine talent at present and it is difficult to pull a real contender out of a mediocre bunch. But Michael Starostin, who gave a good account of himself in the 1979 Final, is still there, though to the Continental Final being held in Lonigo, Italy, on July 27.

Egon Muller, not the name that he was, is back in the hunt, too, and a prime candidate for a place in Gothenburg. Jiri Stancl must be the pick of the Czechoslovakian riders with Zenon Plech and Edward Jancarz top of the Poles.

Roman Jankowski, so impressive with Hackney since his arrival in Britain this year, has gone out.

One can argue that if Schwartz, Sigalos, Preston and England's Malcolm Simmons — a premature casualty here — were to contest the Continental Final they would probably qualify, which highlights the dubious nature of the current system.

The Scandinavian rounds have produced some surprises as well. Sweden held three meetings with the top scorer going straight to the World Final. Reading's Jan Andersson finished with the highest aggregate tally and at this stage is the only rider assured of his berth on September 5.

Other Swedes, including World Champion Anders Michanek, then joined riders from Denmark, Finland and Norway in the Nordic Final held in Skien on June 15. Hans Nielsen won that with 15 points, ahead of Ole Olsen, Finn Thomsen, Bent Rasmussen and Kai Niemi.

A good day for the Danes although Bo Petersen, well fancied by many as a World Championship prospect, was eliminated.

All of which brings us back to this evening and a nicely balanced Commonwealth Final. Nine go through to the Inter-Continental Final at the London White City on August 3.

Say it quickly and it doesn't sound too difficult a task for the sort of riders we have on parade. But then ask yourself to name the seven who will go out and whatever permutation you come up with some prize guys will get the axe.

England have 10 riders here and whatever happens one will have to go. But what are the odds of nine Englishmen taking the places up for grabs. Corals would no doubt be pleased to answer....and take your money!

The Australasians are all experienced, top class riders geared up to safely negotiate this hurdle.

No predictions from me — I have fallen on my face too often — but I can assure you that after a dozen races there will be some worried folk in the pits with riders grabbing programmes to work out who can do what, to whom, when, how and so on.

Any man who, at that stage, has managed a hat-trick of wins will be contenting himself in the knowledge that his place is booked. Nine points will certainly be enough.....perhaps even eight or seven. Who knows?





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



